We understand the spirit that helped create this co-op must be

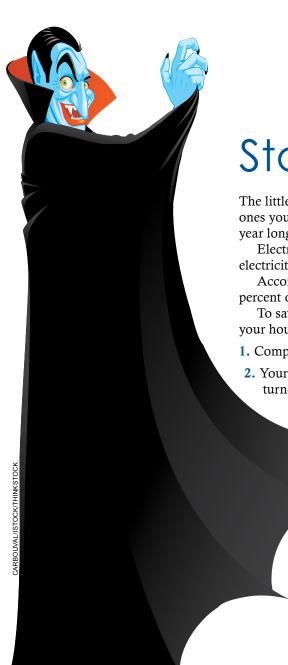
continually nurtured. While times and technology will continue to change, our commitment to you will not.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, vampires account for up to 5 percent of the energy in your house.

- 1. Computers, modems, routers, printers, and other related equipment.
- **2.** Your flat-screen TV. The larger it is, the more energy it uses, even when turned off.

NOTICE OF RATE DECREASE

Pursuant to the Kentucky Public Service Commission's (Commission) orders in Case No. 2017-00009, dated August 7, 2017, the following rates and charges are prescribed for the customers in the area served by Clark Energy Cooperative, Inc. All other rates and charges not specifically mentioned herein shall remain the same as those in effect under authority of the Commission prior to the effective date of September 1, 2017, of this Order and will be reflected on member-owners' electric bills as of October 1, 2017.

These decreases are a pass-through to the member-owner as a result of fuel adjustment charge decreases in the wholesale power supplier's rates.
